

Education and Training Outcomes: A Selected Overview

The Indiana University Counseling Psychology PhD program, which is accredited by the American Psychological Association, [www.apa.org, Office of Program Consultation and Accreditation, 750 First Street, NE • Washington, DC • 20002-4242 • 202-336-5979] currently has 46 active students, consisting of 35 females and 11 males. 26 students are Caucasian, 18 students are members of ethnic minority groups (5 are African-American, 5 are Latino/a, and 8 are Asian or Asian-American), and ten are from countries other than the United States. 34/46, or 74%, had advanced degrees (such as a Masters) from counseling-related fields when they were admitted to the program. Twelve students entered without a master's degree. Almost all students receive some amount of financial aid.

Time to Completion

Since 2001, our program has graduated 38 students. The mean and median times in years of completion for these 38 graduates are listed (these statistics include the *one* year of predoctoral internship) are provided below. Note: Students who took longer than seven years to defend their dissertation were required to re-validate their coursework.

Internship Data

Since 2001, 52 students have applied for internship, and all were accepted except for two individuals who limited their search to a specific geographic location but then were accepted the following year. Thus, our placement rate for first time applications for internship is 96%. It is safe to say that the 2 who were not placed initially would have been placed the first time if they had not restricted their application to a very narrow geographic area.

The following information is for students who went on internship between 2001-2008.

Paid internships: 96%, (50/52)

APPIC member internships: 96%, 50/52

APA approved internships: 92%, (48/52) * The students who did not go to APA-approved sites did that as a matter of personal choice and primarily for family reasons; they chose well-known university sites whose programs happened not to be APA approved.

Attrition Rate Data

Since 2001, 48 students have enrolled in the program. Seven have since graduated with a doctorate, 35 are still enrolled, and 6 have left the program for personal reasons, yielding an attrition rate of 12.5%. Students left for a variety of reasons. The majority withdrew due to the following issues: serious medical problems, change of interest, transferring with advisor to another university, changes in family situation, and finally one was suspended. One of the students who withdrew has applied for reinstatement.
