BORROWER'S CARD

Patrons must have an IU ID card or IU Libraries borrower's card to check out library materials. A borrower's card may be issued to students, faculty, and staff for colleges and universities in Indiana and to Indiana residents. A photo ID is required when requesting a card. Lost or stolen borrower's cards should be reported to the library.

CELL PHONES

Please silence your cell phone while you are in the library.

COMPUTER WORKSTATION POLICIES

Patrons using library resources have priority on the library workstations. STC workstations may be used on a first-come basis. Workstations may be locked for up to 15 minutes, after which time they will be restarted. Guest access must be authorized by a full-time library staff member; a picture ID is required. Copy machines are located in the library's copy room. Copy cards are available for purchase and additional money may be added to the card through the Value Transfer Station located in the copy room. Refund forms are available at the Reference and Circulation Desks. The library does not have change.

Overdues

Notices for overdue books are sent out when a book is 7 days overdue and again when a book is 30 days overdue. Patrons receiving a notice for an item that has been returned should contact the Circulation Coordinator. After an item is 51 days overdue a bill is processed. If an item is returned after a bill has been sent, the charge is adjusted to an overdue fine and processing fee. The bill or adjustment must be paid through the Office of the Bursar.

Recalling

All items are subject to recall after two weeks regardless of loan period. Overdue recall fines are \$25.00. Recalled items may not be renewed.

Renewing

Materials may be renewed in person, or by phone (856-8592), e-mail (libeduc@indiana.edu), or online through IUCAT (<http://www.iucat.iu.edu/>) "My Account".

Returning

Returning materials should be placed in the book returns. Materials from other Indiana University Libraries may be returned to the Education Library. Materials from the Education Library may be returned to any Indiana University library.

MICROFICHE READER/SCANNER

Microfiche reader/scanner is located in the center of the library near the ERIC microfiche collection. Microfiche/film may be scanned and printed to a networked printer.

SCANNERS AND PRINTERS

Three flatbed scanners and two black & white networked printers are available in the library.

UNSUPERVISED MINORS

Non-IU students under the age of 18 should not be in the Education Building without adult supervision.



Library Catalog Searching: IUCAT & WorldCat.org

Use IUCAT to find...

- (Almost) Everything owned by IU Libraries statewide
- All e-journal titles to which IU has access
- Most e-books
- Items currently on reserve or on order

Login to **IUCAT** to review/renew what you have checked out from the IU Libraries ([My Account](#)) Use [Request Delivery](#) and ALF delivery services Create lists of items ([My Lists](#)) relevant to your research

Use WorldCat.org to find...

- Many materials owned by the IU Libraries, plus materials owned by other libraries.
- Some research articles and other electronic resources.

WorldCat.org has more than 33 million bibliographic records from libraries around the world, including the IU Libraries. WorldCat.org also provides citations for items in a variety of styles, including APA. Use [interlibrary loan](#) to request materials owned by other institutions' libraries.

A few notes about these catalogs:

IUB Libraries provide access to many more articles than can be found in **WorldCat.org**. Please ask us, if you would like help finding and searching any of the nearly 500 electronic indexes available at IUB.

Both catalogs (**IUCAT & WorldCat.org**) are Unicode compatible, so you can search using non-Roman scripts. IUCAT and WorldCat.org also provide [permalinks](#) (persistent URLs) to individual records, and easy access to [interlibrary loan](#), so that you can request items not currently available at IU. **IUCAT** also allows you to keep and share links to searches and/or lists of items.

Ways of Searching IUCAT

(Remember: Before you begin, **login!**)

Leave "Library" set to "ALL" to see materials relating to your search at all IU library locations.

A word (or two) about search results in IUCAT:

Keyword Search Results — Most of the searches you do will return item records which display the title, author, date of publication and the code of the libraries (or library) that own the item. The list of records appears in LIFO (Last In/ First Out) order. **Results (of 999 or fewer items) may be sorted** by author, subject, title, relevance, date (Old to New, or New to Old) by scrolling to the bottom of the Search Results screen and selecting a sort order.

Browsing Search Results — When you search IUCAT with either **Begins With (Browse)** or **Call Number Search**, the item that best matches your search will appear on the second line of the **Browsing Results** screen. The remaining items are listed in alphabetical (or call number) order. Each listing is followed by a number. This number refers to the number of records associated with that name (author), term or subject heading.

Narrowing Search by Location — When you search for materials in IUCAT, you can limit your search to a specific library and/or shelving location. The eight main shelving locations in the Education Library are: Periodicals, Reference, Stacks, Teaching Materials Center, Education Library—Children’s Collection, Education Library—Dissertations, Education Library—Textbooks, and Education Library—Videos.

Use the  **text call #** feature on the item record page in IUCAT to text a call number directly to your phone.

Searching WorldCat.org

- **Advanced Search** — Use the advanced search for more options. Search by keyword, title, author, subject, ISBN/ISSN or journal title. Limit results by format, date, language, and more.
- **Facets** — Narrow your search results by clicking one or more of the boxes in the Narrow by Format area or by clicking any of the links the Refine Your Search to the left of the search results.
- **Selecting libraries** — While you cannot limit your search to certain libraries, once you have done a search you can see if IU owns a copy of a particular item by clicking on the title of the item, scrolling down to the section of the record titled "Find a copy in the library" and entering 47401 for the zip code.

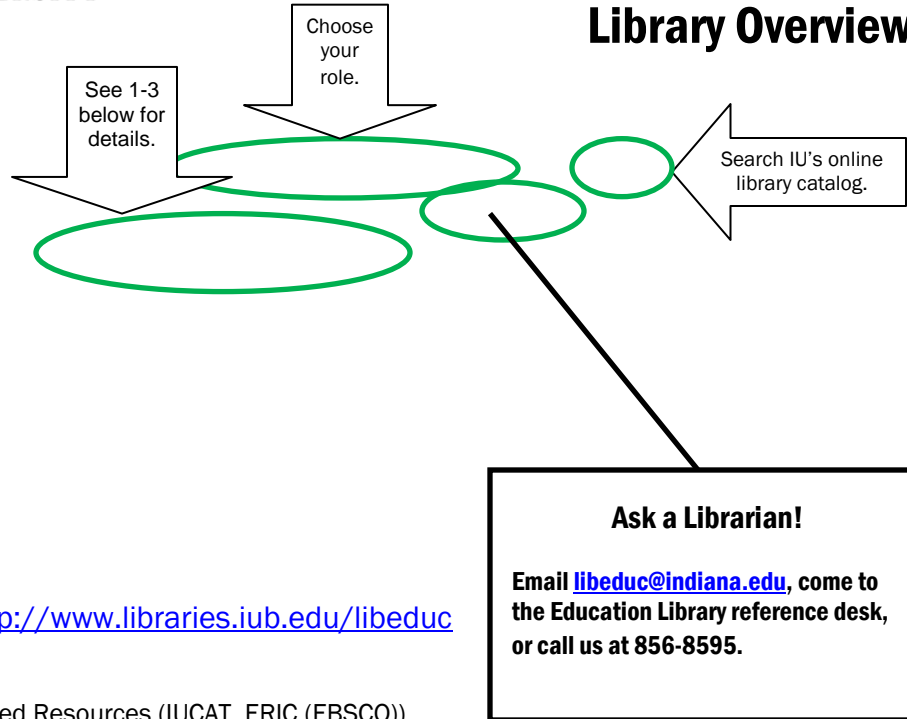

In addition, some materials (i.e. reference books, other non-circulating collections and short term loan collections) from other libraries may be excluded; Request Article Delivery – applies only to items held on the IUB campus.*

Navigating the Education Library

Education Library Map (<http://www.indiana.edu/~libeduc/map.html>): Look under Useful Links on the home page. Noting both the call number and the shelving location as listed in the IUCAT library catalog will help you find an item on the shelf. Use the  **text call #** feature in IUCAT to send a call number to your phone as a text message.

A few notes on policies & equipment:

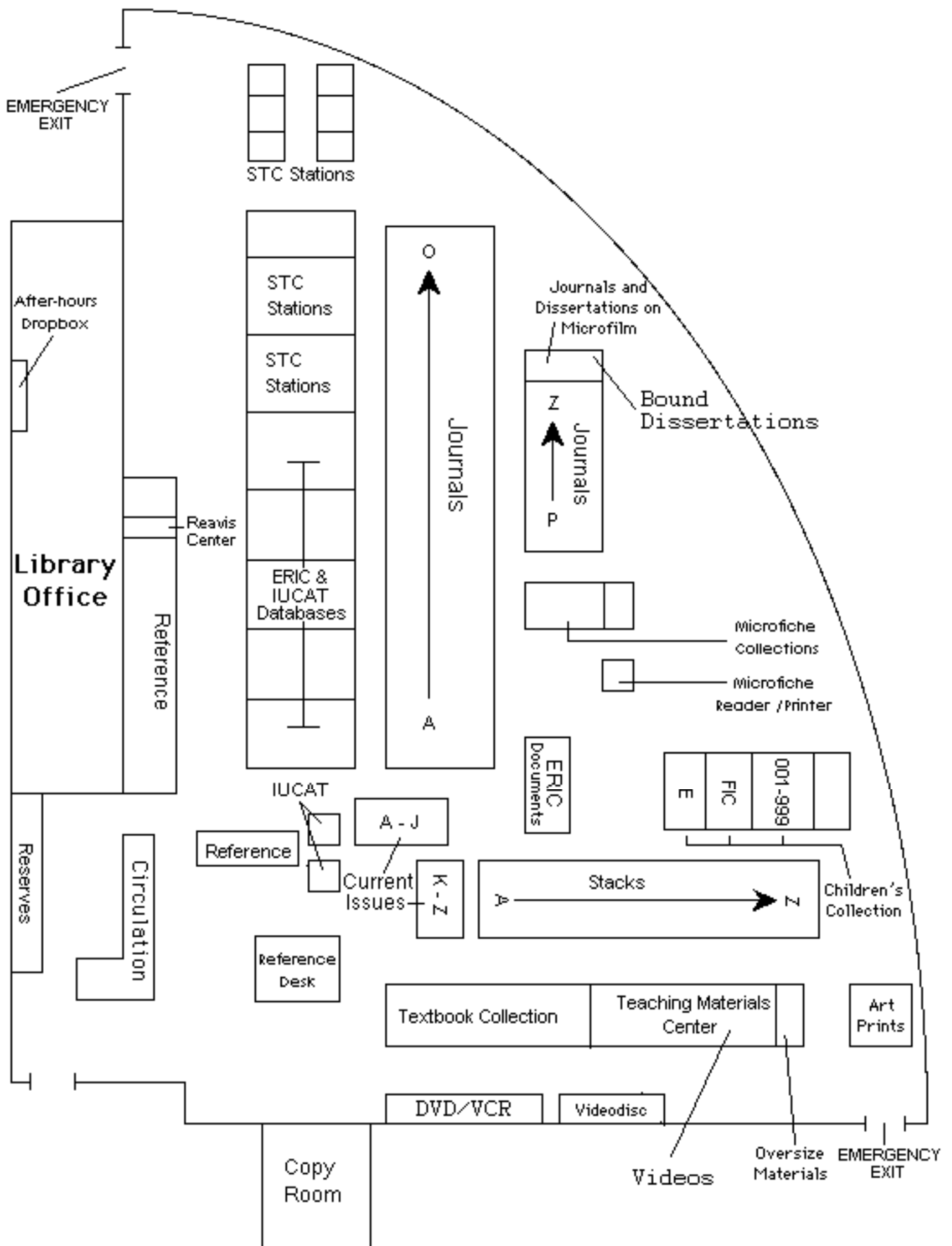

Instructor Directions for Addressing an Incident of Plagiarism

1. Meet with the student
2. Decide on sanctions
3. Notify Pam Freeman in the Office of Student Ethics (855-5419)

If the student has no prior academic misconduct, the instructor sanction is used. If the student has prior record of academic misconduct, the dean of students may apply harsher penalties, such as suspension or expulsion.

Plagiarism detection and prevention

Educate students by using the resources provided by the School of Education website. There is so much misinformation and ignorance among students about what actually constitutes plagiarism and the consequences of this academic misconduct.
