The Counseling Psychology Track is well suited for those students who envision careers in mental health, social service and other settings where their skills will facilitate the well-being of others. Graduates from the track will be suited for entry-level jobs in the community and social service occupations. While they will not be independent practitioners, they would be able to be in entry-level positions under the supervision of licensed practitioners on interdisciplinary teams in mental health settings.

Course requirements for this program are valid at IUB as reflected in the School of Education Bulletin. A four-year college plan requires completion of 15 credits each semester. A 2.5 GPA overall is required for retention and graduation. A total of 120 credits is required for graduation.

Students must complete all General Education and Major requirements. Any acceptable General Education course which is also required in the major may apply to (double count in) both required areas. Courses common to the areas of World Culture, Arts and Humanities, and Social and Historical Studies may also double count. However, credit for such courses counts only once toward the total credits for a degree.
