SCHOOL OF EDUCATION Bloomington Students who select the Higher Education and Student Affairs Track will gain the knowledge and skills necessary to transition into a variety of entry-level positions on college campuses. Positions will typically focus on working directly with undergraduate college students, including academic advising, student organization advising, leadership education, orientation, and residential programs and services.

Course requirements for this program are valid at IUB as reflected in the School of Education Bulletin. A fouryear college plan requires completion of 15 credits each semester. A 2.5 GPA overall is required for retention and graduation. A total of 120 credits is required for graduation.

Students must complete all General Education and Major requirements. Any acceptable General Education course which is also required in the major may apply to (double count in) both required areas. Courses common to the areas of World Culture, Arts and Humanities, and Social and Historical Studies may also double count. However, credit for such courses counts only once toward the total credits for a degree.
