This Bachelor of Science in Education in Secondary Special Education leads to teacher licensure at the secondary level (grades 5-12) in special education (Exceptional Needs - Mild Intervention). Candidates have the option of adding licensure in Language Arts/English. Course requirements for this program are valid at IUB as reflected in the School of Education Bulletin. A four-year college plan requires completion of 15 credits each semester. A 2.5 GPA overall is required for retention and graduation. A total of 120 credits is required for graduation.
