COMMUNITY ARTS EDUCATION MINOR (NON-LICENSURE)

The Community Arts Education Minor is designed for undergraduates to enhance their qualifications as they seek employment in recreation centers, community arts centers, museums, after school, adult or early child care settings, continuing education, therapeutic or remedial settings, or a very wide range of other community-based sites in which participants may experience and learn about the arts. The selection of courses in the minor will introduce theory, issues, and pedagogical strategies related to arts education for children, youth, and adult learners. In addition, the courses provide numerous opportunities to learn in context through field and practical experiences. A grade of "C" or higher in each course and a minimum 2.0 GPA in the minor is required.

- NOTE:**
- Students must complete 15 credits for the minor. All courses must be completed with a grade of C or higher. Courses must average a minimum of 2.0 overall to earn the minor.
 - Minimum of 9 credits must be at the 300 level or higher.
 - Only one (1) education course may double count for both a license addition and an academic minor.
 - Only one (1) education course may overlap between an education program and an academic minor.
 - No course overlap is allowed between academic minors and/or certificates. (e.g., EDUC-M 200 cannot be used to fulfill a requirement in both the Community Arts Education minor and the Educational Studies minor.)
