EDUCATIONAL STUDIES MINOR (NON-TEACHING)

The Educational Studies minor is designed for undergraduates outside the School of Education interested in education as a field of study. For example, as a social institution, public policy arena, or as a developmental process. Students seeking a minor in Educational Studies are required to complete a total of 15 credit hours of course work.

- NOTE:**
- Students must complete 15 credits for the minor. All courses must be completed with a grade of C or higher. Courses must average a minimum of 2.0 overall to earn the minor.
 - Minimum of 9 hours must be at the 300 or 400 level.
 - Only one (1) course may double count for both a license addition and an academic minor.
 - Only one (1) education course may overlap between an education program and an academic minor.
 - No course overlap is allowed between academic minors and/or certificates (e.g., EDUC-H 340 cannot be used to fulfill a requirement in both Educational Studies minor and International and Comparative Education minor.)
